

LOCAL HISTORY The Master Builder and the Burham brick

Thomas Cubitt (25 February 1788 -20 December 1855) was a master builder, notable for developing many of the historic streets and squares of London, especially in Belgravia. Pimlico and Bloomsbury. He was also the architect of Osborne House on the Isle of Wight for Queen Victoria

When Cubitt's exhausted Caledonian Road brickfield in east London needed replacing, he discovered the gault clay at Burham: this was perfect for his needs and was situated near to the river, which provided transport for the finished product.

Between 1851 and 1853 he set up a new mechanised brickworks at Burham on the east bank of the Medway. He acquired several parcels of land in the area on which his brickworks would be built. The land was also used to provide housing for his employees, which led to the expansion of Eccles.

He built Rose Villa for his works manager - William Varney - who had been in his employ for around 40 years, and nearby Rose Cottage for the works foreman Daniel Sharp. He also brought key workers from his London brickfields, but employed mostly unskilled local agricultural labourers, who could be trained on the job. Varnes Street and Belgrave Street in Eccles are road names that bear witness to Cubbit's enterprise in the area.

At the time, Cubitt's works were the most modern in the industry. They used machines which mixed and kneaded the clay, moulded it into shape, and fired the bricks in a system of kilns and drying rooms.

A network of tramways moved clay and bricks around the site. He used the lie of the land to reduce the need

for manual labour, raw materials were sourced from higher land, and each process occurred at a lower level, the finished product being created by the wharf side ready for loading into barges.

By 1859 the Works produced 25 -30 million bricks per year, and employed between 600 and 700 men and boys. Drain pipes and ornamental flower and chimney pots were also manufactured.

The ornamental bricks that were produced can be seen above the doorways and windows of houses in Rochester Road, Church Street and Bell I ane.

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HORTICULTURE Sycamore seedlings are sneaky beasts, here's how to deal with them



As spring gives way to summer it can feel like the weeds will take over completely, so vigorous are they after their long sleep. While it is true that they diminish over the years if your plot has been kept in good order it is also true that nature abhors a vacuum and any bare soil is an invitation to be quickly colonised by weeds.

Sometimes it looks like dandelions will take over the world. Deal with them early, don't let them flower. They quieten down as it gets warmer, until you get another flush of them when it cools down in the autumn.

At this time of year a good hoe is your best friend. First thing every visit I hoe all around, snip the weeds and gets the muscles moving. Planting in straight rows makes it easy and fast to hoe between the rows. You might need to hand weed in the rows but you can do that each time you thin the young plants.

Depending on which way the wind blew last autumn your plot can be host to sycamore seedlings. The hoe deals with them quite easily but they are sneaky beasts, disguising themselves as blackcurrant bushes and in amongst the raspberries. Once they get 2 proper leaves they are hard or impossible to tug out so they have to be eased out with a fork.

If you are lucky enough to have access to enough material, mulching

will prevent most weeds from germinating or growing as well as conserving moisture. Comfrey and borage grown on the plot are useful mulches as well as grass cuttings from paths. I have heard that strulch is a great mulch material but far too expensive to use over large areas. I tend to mulch around climbing French beans where it is hard to get the hoe in.

Nearly all weeds can be controlled by prompt action but sometimes they can get into places difficult to deal with. Couch grass and bindweed can easily get a hold among perennial crops and plants, especially under fruit bushes. Although I prefer to grow organically in my garden and on my allotment I am not precious about it and there are odd occasions I will reach for the roundup (glyhosate). A quick very careful squirt on growing leaves in spring when they are growing will see them gone without harming the bushes if you ensure you don't get any on the leaves of your current, gooseberry or raspberries. This uses a tiny amount of chemical unlike when farmers spray entire fields with the stuff repeatedly.

Even with all your hoeing and weed spraying sometimes I find getting down and dirty to hand weed between your crops can be quite relaxing and therapeutic with a little

music to keep you going.

WHISPERS OF YESTERDAY Pubs, cobblers, carnivals & kindly ladies: all you should know about Burham



Vince Wisdom was born in 1945 and has lived in Burham all his life. He was one of six brothers and as the family grew, he moved house several times before finally settling in Rochester Road. Vince went to the local primary school, that used to be beside The Windmill Pub, and at the age of 12 transferred to the Burham Boys' School, now the Old School Community Centre.

He has memories of Rochester Road when it was just a dirt track bustling with activity. There were a dozen or so businesses dotted along the central section with several pubs, butchers, grocers, general stores and a cobbler to name just a few! A single pump selling petrol, now a house, sticks out in his memory but the one person that made an indelible impression on the young Vince was a Miss Cole who ran a sweet shop. All the village children were made very welcome by her and able to buy a bag of sweets for 1d (less than 1/2p) or those without any money were often given one for free. A kind, caring person, she lived with her brother known as Jumbo and provided a bench in the shop for her pals to rest and chat! Vince a spritely 80 year old, is still very active in village life as Chair of the Trustees of the Old School Community Centre. He is also responsible for the general upkeep and maintenance of the Burham War Memorial gardens.



Jim & Dot Dowle moved to Church Street in the late 1960s as newly weds and have lived in the village for almost six decades. Their house was opposite 'The First & Last Pub'. which caught fire and burnt down shortly after they moved in. Jim has vivid memories of trying to douse the flames with a garden hose and throwing grit at the windows to rouse the two sleeping landlords who were blissfully unaware of what was happening! The village rallied round to feed, clothe and rehouse the unfortunate pair whilst their own property was rebuilt.

Jim and Dot have always been active in village life and provided a lorry for the Carnival parade for many years which boasted 30+ floats, drum majorettes and a May Queen. They helped start, and still are active members of, the Burham Outings & Social Club which runs a wide range of trips and events for local residents. Jim was also much in demand as the volunteer driver for Burham Community Mini Bus which at the time was housed at Frost's Garage. One cause that is very close to Jim & Dot's heart is leukaemia research having tragically lost a young grandchild to the disease. They started fund raising through the Medway branch before establishing a family charity supported and sponsored by their own business J. Dowle Fencing & Tree Surgery

COMMUNITY SAFETY Pedal bike thefts, this is how to protect yourself



So far in 2025 we have received reports of pedal cycle thefts across the district including Burham. Often stolen bikes have been found but the owners have not been located. Please take a moment to register your frame number on the national bike registration database. The frame number is usually found underneath the bike between the pedals or where the back wheel slots in. The national bike registration database is online at www.bikeregister.com. This way, if vour bike is ever stolen and recovered by the police, it can be traced back to you. Further ways to protect your bike:

Double lock it. Using two locks slows thieves down and makes your bike less of a target. Use two quality locks, at least one of which is a D lock. Thieves are less likely to carry multiple tools, so use two different types of lock if possible

Lock the lot. Lock the frame and both wheels to a secure cycle stand Secure it. Secure your bike as close to the stand as possible to give any thieves little or no room to manoeuvre

Take removable parts with you.

Take parts that are easy to remove with you, such as wheels, lights, baskets or the saddle. Or use locking skewers or nuts which can increase security by securing the bike's components to the frame permanently

Mark it. Get your bike security marked. It's a highly effective, visible deterrent to bike thieves

Act fast. If your bike has been stolen, contact us as soon as possible by contacting 999 (if happening at the time) or reporting online (non-emergency). Give us your frame number, cycle database number, a photo and any other details and make sure you update the status on the cycle database where you registered it. The sooner we know, the sooner we can act, which might stop it being sold on.

THE VALE BAKERY Richard Wood, spear chucker to cornucopia

The Vale Bakery was established before the Second World War and has been a fixture in Burham for almost a century. Richard Wood took it over in the late 1970s and and for almost fifty years has been producing freshly baked bread and mouthwatering confections, which are his particular speciality.

He grew up on the Isle of Sheppey and comes from a long line of family bakers with roots that go back to the early 1800s. He went to school on the isle before moving to Goudhurst School as a boarder. He completed his studies at the South Bank Polytechnic where he trained as a master baker.

After he graduated, Richard joined the family business Wood & Sons which had a thriving retail and wholesale business on Sheppey supplying local shops and major businesses such as Leysdown holiday park.

After six years of working with his father, uncle and cousins he decided to branch out on his own and a chance conversation with a

supplier led him to Burham where Mr & Mrs Smith, who owned The Vale Bakery at the time, were looking to retire.

After a transition period working alongside the Smiths, Richard took over the business entirely which employed five staff at the time. His wife ran the shop allowing Richard to concentrate on a busy wholesale round of pubs and shops including The Aylesford Priory where he supplied the Tea Rooms and residents for many years. His cornucopia or harvest bread with a horn stuffed with Kent fruits such as apples and pears was a particular favourite for Harvest Festival services.

In addition to his baking skills, Richard was an accomplished athlete in his youth and he was selected as first reserve Javelin thrower for the Helsinki European Games. He was also a keen skier until mobility issues forced him to give up the sport

The Anima Appointment & Enquiry System

The new Triage Service 'Anima' system is now active for making appointments and medical queries. The exception is routine repeat prescription requests and long term condition review appointments which will be managed the same as before. Appointments for nursing and healthcare assistant services such as blood tests, smears, dressings, injections and ECG's will still need to be made over the phone initially but will be reviewed in due course. Please visit our website to register and create an Anima account if you have not already done so to enable you to use the service.

Defibrillators - situated at Burham Parish Office, Frost's Service Station, Wouldham Village Hall and the Community Centre, Tolhurst Road, Peters Village. If a machine is needed call 999 for the code and instructions.

Prescriptions - arrangements can be made to have these collected thanks to a service offered by the church. The surgery requires 4 days notice to prepare them and 24 hours notice is required for volunteers to collect them. 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BURHAM PARISH COUNCIL A roundup of the local news and issues



Website

The domain name for the website has been changed to "www.burhamparishcouncil.org.uk". The website is exactly the same, just the domain name has changed.

Highway issues

Scarborough Terrace (Rochester Rd) speeding: A formal request for a data survey to be carried out has been submitted to KCC for March/April 2025 which is approx. 6 months from when the work was carried out. This is to ascertain whether the work has been successful or not.

"Welcome to Burham" sign Village Road, Peters Village. KCC has advised: "This will be raised in the new financial year which will be from April 1 and should be completed by summer 2025. Once we have committed the works and have a date, I will be able to update you".

You may recall that we requested via the Highway Improvement Plan (HIP) three zebra crossings. This was due to the amount of potentially increased traffic through Burham due to the Land in Eccles development. Please see below the locations and the comments from KCC Highways.

"Following a brief desktop study, the First (Rochester Rd/Pilgrims Way before Bull Lane junction location) is not street lit and therefore the cost to upgrade this to a zebra would be significantly more that £20k as we would need to install lighting. In addition, the existing crossing is too close to the junction and therefore

this site would not qualify for a zebra crossing.

Second location New Court Rd," junction" with Bell Lane – KCC Highways looked at the wrong location. They looked at Rochester Rd, just before junction with Bell Lane – They have been advised of this error. Correct location looked at. New Court Road is not street lit, and the existing speed limit is 40mph therefore, this location would not meet the criteria for a zebra crossing.

Third Location New Court Rd junction with Church Street: KCC Highways have advised: Following a brief desktop study, this location is not street lit, and the posted speed limit is 40mph which does not meet the site requirements for a zebra crossing."

Whilst the pot holes and vegetation have been addressed on Pilgrims Way (split road), the litter is still very apparent. TMBC have been made aware and will address in due course.

Burham War Memorial

There has been no update on the installation of the 2 x plaques from Medway Memorials. They are waiting for the temperatures to rise, so hopefully we will have some news very soon. The same goes for the war memorial cross – whereby scans and measurements are required to be taken to enable The War memorial Restoration Company to manufacture the new cross.

Devolution

It was announced on 5 February 2025 that Kent has NOT been accepted onto the Devolution <u>Priority</u> Programme and will not be postponing elections. Whilst devolution will still happen, it is some way off.
