#### The Frost family's fifty-five years of service



Frost's Service Station and the Frost family have been part and parcel of the village since the midsixties.

Nel and Bill Frost Snr with their son Bill bought the garage in 1965 after it had been closed for many years and started with a repair garage and motor accessory shop selling National Benzol Fuel.

They expanded the business by extending the workshop, employing mechanics, bought a recovery vehicle and started doing MOTs.

The family was originally from Peckham where they had an established garage business but were forced to relocate when the site their premises occupied was acquired for redevelopment.

Moving to a small rural village was quite a culture shock, certainly for the younger Bill who was used to the hustle and bustle of a London suburb!

The business continued to expand with a canopy being added to the forecourt and the number of pumps

increased from four to seven. Attended service was replaced by self-service allowing petrol to be dispensed without getting soaked! A car wash was also added which proved very popular.

In 1971, the younger Bill and Pam were married at St Mary's Church when it was located at the top of Church Street. Pam became an active member of the business helping Nel in the shop which was extended to sell groceries to support the village people.

Both Bill Snr and Bill served as Parish Councillors, younger Bill for around 30 years supporting the the local community in different ways from garaging and servicing the Community Bus and sponsoring a carnival float to playing Father Christmas for the pre-school children. Sadly, Bill Snr died in 1989 when Nel retired leaving Bill and Pam running the business.

As Bill & Pam's family grew up they joined the business helping in the workshop and shop. The shop was extended into a larger convenience store and an off-licence added which was run by the family and local staff employed to help out with the extended opening hours.

When Covid hit the country and people had to stay isolated at home, Frost's ran a call & collect service for groceries and offered a home food delivery service for those unable to get out.

By 2020, Pam & Bill had turned seventy and the family agreed it was time to sell the business after 55 years of service to the public.







#### St Mary's Church, Burham

# Peat or peat free, searching for the black gold?



People often complain about the quality and how expensive shopbought compost has been getting over the years. Many also ask if peat or peat free is better? Well, with the environmental laws banning digging the peat moss marshes, peat compost is no longer viable. We therefore have to find other solutions and making our own to use in the best way possible for each production stage of growing, from seed to seedling and also when in the ground. Here are my tips on getting started and with the right ingredients, patience and a little hard work you will get the black gold you are looking for:-

Select a compost bin: Choose a suitable container for the available area, plastic bins and tumblers are easy to use and manage. They help to contain odours and retain moisture. Wooden bins provide good airflow but may require more maintenance. A pile or heap is simplest and most cost-effective option but may attract pests and take longer to decompose.

Gather your compostable materials: Collect a mixture of "Green" and "Brown" materials for your compost pile.

**Green Materials:** High in nitrogen such as kitchen scraps - fruit and vegetable peels, coffee grounds, eggshells - grass clippings and fresh garden trimmings.

Brown Materials: High in carbon, such as dry leaves, straw, shredded paper, cardboard (minus any Sellotape or staples) and any woody plant trimmings. Avoid adding meat, dairy and pet waist to your compost pile as they can attract pests and create odours.

Layering & mixing materials: Start your compost pile by layering green and brown materials in alternating layers. Aim for a 50/50 balance of roughly green and brown matter by volume. Chop and shred large materials to speedup decomposition and improve airflow. Regularly turn or mix the compost to aerate and ensure even decomposition (I turn mine fortnightly).

Add water and adjust moisture: Keep your compost pile moist but not waterlogged like a wrung-out sponge. Water occasionally, especially during the dry weather to maintain proper moisture levels. Cover the pile with a lid or tarp to prevent excessive moisture during rainy periods.

Monitor temperature and decomposition: Composting is a Microbial process that generates heat as organic matter breaks down. Use a compost thermometer to monitor the internal temperature of the pile, aiming for a range of 120-160°F (49-71°C) for optimal decomposition.

# **Burham at War**



This account is based upon the memoirs of a former native and long time resident of Burham, Ron Baker.

Ron was born at his family home, Reservoir House in 1940. The property, which was situated in the area now occupied by the Water Treatment Works, had been the residence of the Burham Brick and Cement Works' chief mechanical engineer, James Fredrick Ware.

The Ware family are believed to have lived at Reservoir House for about forty years since 1890. Ron's parents rented the property after the Ware's departure in 1939.

During 1944 the house became directly affected by the second World War. Ron remembers clearly the noise and smell of burning as incendiary bombs came through the roof and into the hallway below.

His father was away serving in the military; his mother and paternal grandmother were resident at the property, with Ron, his elder brother, and the youngest of his two sisters. The ladies gathered up important items to take with them.

His mother particularly wanted to take the radio - one powered by an accumulator - as they had no mains

electricity. She was lucky not to be injured as the radio blew up, presumably because of the heat, before she got to it.

After a short time, Ron's maternal grandfather, who was the night watchman at the Works, came to lead them to safety. Ron remembers being led through the burning undergrowth, with the noise of enemy aircraft overhead, to nearby Rose Villa.

This house had been the residence of previous Works' managers, but was now occupied by two other local families. Ron does not remember how long they spent here but he, his mother, his brother and sister were evacuated to Newport, South Wales.

His Grandmother went to live with other relatives at Aylesford. Ron, his mother, and siblings did not remain in Wales for very long; they also moved in with his relatives at Aylesford until Reservoir House was repaired.

On reflection, Ron believes the reason they were bombed is because the area was on the direct flight route for all the bombing raids on London, plus Burham had an antiaircraft gun-site within half an hour of where he lived.

Reservoir House stood nearby the reservoir created to supply water for the brick and cement works. It was fed by the river - it is not to be confused with the modern reservoir.

Turn or mix your compost pile when the internal temperature starts to drop, typically every 1-2 weeks. Patience and time: Homemade compost is a natural process that takes time, depending on factors such as temperature, moisture, and the mix of materials; it can take several months to a year for compost to fully mature. Be patient and allow the composting process to work its magic. Periodically check the pile and make adjustments as needed.

Harvest and use your compost:
Once your compost is dark, crumbly and earthy smelling, it's ready to use in your garden. Screen or sift the finished compost to remove any

large chunks or un-decomposed

materials. Incorporate the compost into garden beds, containers or planting holes to enrich the soil and promote healthy plant growth. During the layering process you can use horse manure as part of your green matter, just remember that for doing your seedlings it may be too rich, but you can be balanced by mixing it with good topsoil and vermiculite.

I personally use a three bin wood built compost system on the allotment which makes it easy for turning and keeping the air circulating within the compost pile. At home I have a Dalek type compost bin which I just leave to do its work and always have enough compost to use in my flower beds etc within my garden.

#### Photographic Exhibition:

This took place in the Old School Community Centre on Friday 1 August and Saturday 2 August 11am 4 pm and was well attended with over 100 people viewing the photos over the two days. Many people have already paid and collected their display photographs. If you were snapped and not able to collect your photo and would like to purchase it at a cost of £2, please contact me. Many thanks to our photographer and his team of volunteers working behind the scenes to deliver this very worthwhile project.

The War Memorial Restoration Company have now replaced the cross on the war memorial, like for like, which was the preference of the War Memorial Trust who part funded the project. Obviously, the cross is very new but will age and weather over time. The grant funding of £3310 has been applied for, with photos of the new cross submitted.

Many positive comments have been received by the parish council regarding this.

The original cross (over 100 years old) has been retained albeit in pieces. It has been suggested that perhaps the pieces could be utilised in a rockery within the gardens. This is something that is being explored. A local resident has also advised that they would be prepared to cover the costs of any further plants.

Finally, the installation of the two new plaques on the free-standing wall at the war memorial has taken place after several delays. The plaques name the "missing" men that were found after the deadline of having them added at the 100-year celebrations in 2021. C/Cllr Andrew Kennedy supported this project with a £500 donation from his members grant. Many thanks to him for his support.

During the summer we had some work carried out to some trees and one removed completely due to Ash die back. Whilst we do not like having to chop trees down, this was unavoidable.
